Director

Currently one of the most sought-after directors in episodic television. She has directed, written, and produced over three dozen shows and films, and is best known for her outstanding work on THE WALKING DEAD. AMERICAN HORROR STORY, QUANTICO, FINDING CARTER. THE STRAIN, SALVATION, ZOO, ELE-MENTARY, DAMIEN, and many more. The daughter of famed director David Lynch, and graduate of the Interlochen Arts Academy, Jennifer got her start at nineteen when she wrote and directed the notorious cult classic BOXING HEL-ENA. which was nominated for a Grand Jury Prize at the Sundance Film Festival. She went on to become the first woman to receive the New York City Horror Film Festival's Best Director Award after her film Surveillance took the top prize at the Sitges Film Festival in Catalonia, Spain— one of the foremost fantasy and horror festivals in the world. She's the author of the book The Secret Diarv of Laura Palmer, based on the famous TWIN PEAKS television series, serves on the board of directors for the Hollywood Horror Museum, and has several upcoming film and television projects in the works.

MARK ALLEN

Mark Allen is an award-winning filmmaker with an MFA from USC School of Cinematic Arts. His screenplays have placed as finalists in the Sundance Screenwriters Lab for the last three consecutive years. He was a finalist of the HBO Writer's Fellowship and was recognized at the 2016 Beverly Hills Film Festival for screenwriting. His award-winning short film VIOLET HOUR (2013) played at numerous festivals around the country, most recently winning Best Short Film at the 2015 Princeton Film Festival.

In 2015, he was awarded the Artists Alliance Screenwriter of the Year award. Prior to attending film school, Mark earned a law degree from UC Berkeley and worked with George Lucas at Lucasfilm and Hillary Clinton on her 2008 presidential campaign. Currently, Mark is writing and developing a feature adaptation of Pat Frank's novel ALAS, BABYLON for Lunacy Productions.

Hernando is a 2016 Directing Fellow for HALF, a mentorship program within Ryan Murphy Productions 20th Century Fox TV-based production company. He will shadow on FEUD, a new FX anthology series starring Jessica Lange and Susan Sarandon as Joan Crawford and Bette Davis on the set of WHAT EVER HAPPENED TO BABY JANE?

Of Haitian and Filipino descent, Hernando holds an MFA in Film and TV Production from USC's School

of Cinematic Arts and a BA in Stage Directing from UCLA's School of Theater, Film and Television. He is a Sundance Fellow who participated in the 2016 New Frontier Virtual Reality Storytelling Lab and whose short, THE DADDY (ANG TATAY), is an Official Selection of the Institute's Short Film Connection.

He is currently developing a myriad of projects for film and television including GET CLOSE, a 2016 Sundance Producing Fellowship Finalist about legendary actress Glenn Close, AMERICAN JOHN, a four-time Sundance Screenwriters Lab Finalist and Tribeca Film Institute selection and PURR, a sexy drama series in development at Endemol Shine.

The award-winning director has participated in the Ingmar Bergman immersion program at Sweden's Lund University, the Reykjavik International Film Festival's Talent Lab, and Film Independent's Project:Involve. His work has screened in Cannes, South Africa, Iceland, the UK, the Bahamas, and across the US. His acclaimed debut feature, A REUNION, was released theatrically in Fall 2015 and is now available Digitally and on Blu-Ray / DVD.

Michea Bryant is a young, eager graduate student in her 2nd year in the Film and TV Production program at the University of Southern California. A Maryland native, she is a diligent worker with a creative mind and a keen eye for detail. Michea is extremely passionate about writing, directing, and producing content that remolds and expands upon the African-American narrative in Hollywood.

A late bloomer in the cinematic arts world, the majority of Michea's life prior to USC was rooted in athletics. Between playing collegiate sports and covering professional sports as a Mass Media major at La Salle University, Michea was undying in her pursuit to become an ESPN analyst. A childhood dream of playing professionally became a dream deferred after Michea suffered severe damage to her knee, ending her basketball career. Sidelined for two summers on crutches, Michea stumbled upon a new love; film and television. Her first two short films, on which she served as writer, director, producer, cinematographer, and editor, were Campus Movie Fest Campus Finalists in 2012 and 2013.

Michea has always been an exceptional editor and writer, creating content for NBC / Comcast Sportsnet as an intern for the Washington Redskins under the tutelage of 10-time Emmy Award winner Larry Michael. In her first year at USC, she has learned so much through a bevy of experiences, which include writing and directing three short films, producing two more, and editing an advanced USC film. She looks forward to exploring the myriad of possibilities here in Hollywood, and she's excited about what the future holds.

SHEA BUTLER

Shea E. Butler, is an award winning filmmaker for her short films, "The Trial of Ben Barry," and her most current film, "The Waystation." "The Waystation" recently was awarded Best Short Horror film at the 2016 Go West Fest and Shea won Best Female Filmmaker Short Films at the 2016 Action On Film International Film Festival. She also directed a segment of the independent feature film BRAD'S UNTITLED RESTAURANT PROJECT which has been released on Vimeo VOD, and three monologues of the award

winning play, THE VAGINA MONOLOGUES, for charity in Los Angeles.

Shea just finished a screenplay adapted from the book, "Langata Rules: Pirates at Lat 10," with the book's author, has written a film noir feature / two-hour pilot that is set in Las Vegas, and is the co-creator of the comic book "Undercover Cockroach." She has also been a development executive and segment producer on reality TV and a script supervisor for television and film.

In 2014 Shea was accepted into and completed the Warner Bros. Television Director's Workshop, and for 2016 she has been accepted into Ryan Murphy's Half Directing Mentorship Program. Shea has a BA in Literature & a MA in TV & Film, and is a member of the Writers Guild, I.A.T.S.E. 871, Alliance of Women Directors, and the Television Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Born in Cairo, Egypt to American parents living abroad, Shea has travelled extensively throughout the world, her most recent trip being a horseback riding safari through the Okavango Delta in Botswana.

RACHEL GOLDBERG

Rachel Goldberg is an award-winning director whose most recent film, MUTED, starring Chandra Wilson (GREY'S ANATOMY) and Malcolm-Jamal Warner (THE COSBY SHOW) sold to HBO. Her work has screened around the world, garnering over 20 awards including the Director's Choice Award from the Oscar-qualifying Rhode Island Int'l Film Festival and Best Narrative Short at Translations: The Seattle Transgender Film Festival. She has been supported by the Ryan Murphy Television Half Directing Men-

torship Program, the Sony Pictures Television Directors Program, We for She's Direct Her program, AFI's Directing Workshop for Women, Film Independent's Project: Involve, and most recently, the FOX Global Directing Initiative.

As a proud participant in AFI's prestigious Directing Workshop for Women, Rachel directed and co-wrote the award-winning NEIGHBORS. This was developed into the feature screenplay TRANSFORMATION AWAITS which was selected for the Sundance Financing Initiative, was recognized by the Academy's Nicholl Fellowship, won the Barren Branches LGBTQ Grand Prize in Screenwriting and was selected for the highly competitive Film Independent Screenwriting Lab. The film is set up at Triangle Road Entertainment with Rachel attached to direct.

Rachel is also attached to helm WAITING FOR CAMELOT which is being produced by Sundance / Cannes alumnus, Todd Remis (MAGIC MAGIC) and TIFF veteran, Julie Snyder (TANNER HALL), as well as CIRCUS CIRCUS based on the play by the same name. She has directed close to 30 productions for stage and screen and her work has been described as "poetry in motion" by the LA Weekly and "stunning" by the LA Stage Scene.

Rachel's experience includes working in the editing department of KILL BILL Vol. 2 and studying under David Sacks (THE SIMPSONS) and Jason Venokur (3rd ROCK FROM THE SUN). Most recently she had the pleasure of shadowing Jennifer Lynch on AMERICAN HORROR STORY and has had been fortunate to shadow on GREY'S ANATOMY, THE FOSTERS and a number of other shows. Rachel earned her in MFA in Directing from the California Institute of the Arts and her BA in Theater and Psychology from the University of Pennsylvania. Rachel serves on the board of the Alliance of Women Directors and the Unusual Suspects Theater Company.

MELISSA HICKEY

Born in Texas, Melissa Hickey is an award-winning filmmaker with a bachelor's in Anthropology from Columbia University and a master's in Directing from the American Film Institute. She is the recipient of the Daniel Petrie Scholarship, the Women in Film Scholarship, and the Richard P. Rogers Spirit of Excellence. Her thesis film NI-NI premiered at Clermont Ferrand, screened at more than 20 international film festivals, and was recognized by the DGA with a Jury Award.

At present, she is developing her first feature film, IT'S ABOUT BOBBY COLLUM, a coming of age set on the Texas Gulf Coast.

NAOMI IWAMOTO

Mentor: Barbara Brown



Naomi Iwamoto is a second generation Japanese American writer and director whose passion for storytelling was nurtured very early on by growing up between two cultures- Japan and the U.S. During these formative years, Naomi learned to listen, observe, and reflect. But, it wasn't until many years later, while enrolled at USC's School of Cinematic Arts where she discovered the kind of stories she wanted to create and the kind of filmmaker she wanted to become.

Naomi directed the comedy documentary, LOST & FOUND, which was fully funded by USC's School of Cinematic Arts, wherein three films are green-lit through a competitive pitch and selection process. Her doc follows women over the age of 85 who find love again after losing their husbands.

Naomi also wrote the Asian American musical, MANGO STICKY RICE, based on her own embarrassing dating history. The rom-com musical follows a binge-eating woman on the quest to find love in the online dating world.

Naomi received the Edward Small Directing Award for excellence in directing and was named an Ace-Nikaido Fellow for advancing understanding of Japan and US-Japan relations.

Currently, she is in post-production for BEST BUDS, a comedy that follows two best friends who reveal their deepest secrets to each other while hot boxing their car the night before they head to college.

She is finishing up an M.F.A. from the USC School of Cinematic Arts and holds a B.A. from UCLA in Political Science and Asian American Studies.

TARIK JACKSON

Mentor: Ian Brennan



A Brooklyn, New York native, Tarik Jackson found filmmaking after a horrendous car accident while a student at Morehouse College in Atlanta, GA. Jackson left the accident unharmed but walked away from the near death experience with a new sense of purpose and focus. Shortly after the accident, Jackson decided that he wanted to leave an everlasting mark on culture, this led Tarik to dive head first in filmmaking. Tarik was a participant in the 2009 Youth Filmmakers program at the American Black

Film Festival. Tarik got accepted to USC's School of Cinematic Arts graduate film program. Upon acceptance into the program Tarik was granted the Muller family scholarship Award. During his third semester at USC, he and fellow classmates Steven Caple Jr. and Vicotria Rose were selected by the faculty to produce a twelve minute film that was finaced by the school. The film A DIFFERENT TREE tells the story of an eight year old using a school assigned family tree to connect with her absent father. The film has since been accepted into numerous festivals and won the American Black Film Festival. After completing his Masters program Tarik co created, directed and co wrote CLASS, an eight episode original series that premiered on YouTube. Since it's release in July of 2015 the series has been viewed over 500,000 times. Tarik is currently in pre production, on his first feature film BUSHBABY, about gentrification in his hometown in Brooklyn.

MAGGIE KILEY

Mentor: Brad Buecker



Maggie Kiley was one of eight directors selected for AFI's Directing Workshop for Women and one of twenty filmmakers chosen for the FOX Global Directors Initiative. Most recently, Maggie was selected as the first participant in Ryan Murphy Television's Half Directing Mentorship program and subsequently is slated to direct an episode in the upcoming season of SCREAM QUEENS on Fox and AMERICAN HOR-ROR STORY on FX Networks.

Maggie's AFI short film, SOME BOYS DON'T LEAVE, played over 50 festivals, garnering awards at Tribeca and Palm Springs. Maggie received the Panavision New Filmmaker Grant for her debut feature, BRIGHTEST STAR. The film, starring Chris Lowell, Rose McIver and Allison Janney, was released by Gravitas theatrically and SVOD in early 2014. Her second film, DIAL A PRAYER, starring Brittany Snow and William H Macy, released in the Spring of 2015. More recently she directed the thriller CAUGHT starring Anna Camp for Mar Vista Entertainment, marking an impressive three features in just three years. CAUGHT world premiered at the 2015 Los Angeles Film Festival as one of eight films in competition in the genre section: Nightfall and was later acquired by Lifetime. Upcoming feature projects include Eyal Alony's SKIN DEEP (for which she is a Directing Fellow at Film Independent) and Alissa Dean's CRICKET with producers Lynn Hendee and Bill Chartoff.

After completing his academic coursework, Kiel was asked by Lee to serve as Directing Assistant on Lee's professional projects. Kiel collaborated with Lee as a co-writer on Lee's recent feature length film and first foray into video games, NBA 2K16's Livin' Da Dream, which sold over 4 Million copies in its first week alone.

Kiel's personal filmic works are investigations of the psychological ramifications of being undervalued and marginalized in modern society.
